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HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTIONS

Wood, Rose, Ryburn and Willems 4 5 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION REQUESTING APPROPRIATE ACTION BY THE CONGRESS, EITHER 6 7 ACTING BY CONSENT OF TWO-THIRDS OF BOTH HOUSES, OR, 8 UPON THE APPLICATION OF THE LEGISLATURES OF TWO-THIRDS 9 OF THE SEVERAL STATES, CALLING A CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION 10 TO PROPOSE AN AMENDMENT TO THE FEDERAL CONSTITUTION TO 11 REQUIRE, WITH CERTAIN EXCEPTIONS, THAT THE TOTAL OF ALL 12 FEDERAL APPROPRIATIONS MAY NOT EXCEED THE TOTAL OF ALL 13 ESTIMATED FEDERAL REVENUES IN ANY FISCAL YEAR. 14 WHEREAS, with each passing year this Nation becomes more deeply in 15 debt as its expenditures grossly and repeatedly exceed available revenues, 16 so that the public debt now exceeds hundreds of billions of dollars; and 17 WHEREAS, the annual Federal budget continually demonstrates an 18 unwillingness or inability of both the legislative and executive branches 19 of the Federal government to curtail spending to conform to available 20 21 WHEREAS, unified budgets do not reflect actual spending because of 22 the exclusion of special outlays which are not included in the budget 23 nor subject to the legal public debt limit; and 24 WHEREAS, knowledgeable planning, fiscal prudence, and plain good 25 sense require that the budget reflect all Federal spending and be in 26 27 28 WHEREAS, believing that fiscal irresponsibility at the Federal level, with the inflation which results from this policy, is the greatest threat 29 which faces our Nation, we firmly believe that constitutional restraint 30 is necessary to bring the fiscal discipline needed to restore financial 31 32 33 WHEREAS, under Article V of the Constitution of the United States, amendments to the Federal Constitution may be proposed by the Congress 34 whenever two-thirds of both Houses deem it necessary, or on the applica-35 tion of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states the Congress

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shall call a constitutional convention for the purpose of proposing 2 amendments. We believe such action vital; 3 NOW THEREFORE.

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BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SEVENTY-SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF 4 5

THAT this Body proposes to the Congress of the United States that procedures be instituted in the Congress to add a new Article to the 7 Constitution of the United States, and that the General Assembly of the 8 State of Arkansas requests the Congress to prepare and submit to the 9 several states an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, 10 requiring in the absence of a national emergency that the total of all 11 Federal appropriations made by the Congress for any fiscal year may not 12 exceed the total of all estimated Federal revenues for that fiscal year; and 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: 14 5

THAT, alternatively, this Body makes application and requests that the Congress of the United States call a constitutional convention for the 6 specific and exclusive purpose of proposing an amendment to the Federal 7 Constitution requiring in the absence of a national emergency that the total of all Federal appropriations made by the Congress for any fiscal 9 year may not exceed the total of all estimated Federal revenues for that fiscal year; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

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THAT this Body also proposes that the legislatures of each of the several states comprising the United States apply to the Congress requesting the enactment of an appropriate amendment to the Federal Constitution, or requiring the Congress to call a constitutional convention for proposing such an amendment to the Federal Constitution; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

THAT copies of this Resolution be sent by the Secretary of State to the Arkansas Congressional Delegation; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

THAT the Secretary of State of the State of Arkansas is directed to send copies of this Joint Resolution to the Secretary of State and presiding officers of both Houses of the Legislature of each of the other States in the Union, the Clerk of the United States House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., and the Secretary of the United States Senate, Washington, D. C.

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
