SECTION 13. (Judges, salaries.) That judges of the Supreme Court shall each receive a salary of \$4500, and the Judges of the District Court shall each receive a salary of \$3000, per annum payable quarterly.

CHAPTER 203.

(Senate File No. 313.)

[Introduced by Mr. King.]

A JOINT RESOLUTION of the thirtieth session of the Legislature of the State of Nebraska, making application to the Congress of the United States for calling a convention for proposing amendments to the Constitution of the United States.

(Preamble.) WHEREAS, We believe that the Senators of the United States should be elected directly by the voters and,

WHEREAS, To authorize such direct election, an amendment to the Constitution of the United States is necessary; and

WHEREAS, The failure of Congress to submit such amendment to the States has made it clear that the only practicable method of securing a submission of such amendment to the States is through a Constitutional Convention to be called by Congress upon the application of the Legislature of two-thirds of all the States; therefore,

*Be It Resolved By the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:*

SECTION 1. **United States Constitutional Convention.** That the Legislature of the State of Nebraska hereby makes application to the Congress of the United States, to call a Constitutional Convention for proposing amendments to the Constitution of the United States.

SECTION 2. (Resolution transmitted.) That this resolution, duly authenticated, shall be delivered forthwith to the President

of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States, with the request that the same shall be laid before the said Senate and House.

CHAPTER 204.

(House Roll No. 228.)

[Introduced by Mr. Hill.]

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition to be held at Seattle, State of Washington A. D. 1909.

*Be it Enacted by the House of Representatives of the State of Nebraska, the Senate Concurring:*

(Alaska—Yukon—Pacific Exposition.) That we indorse and approve the aims and purposes of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition to be held at Seattle, State of Washington, A. D. 1909, and recommend the United States Government to participate therein:

That certified copies of this resolution be sent to the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and to the Senators and Representatives of this State.

Approved March 29, 1907.
